## SENIOR ADVISING GROUP

The Senior Advising Group has been very busy! We are working on multiple initiatives on behalf of our advising community. This semester we have been looking at ways to improve processes in order to streamline and simplify our advising practices. We meet regularly with representatives from both Student Affairs and Enrollment Management to improve communication regarding updates and promote collaboration on various initiatives. Below are subcommittees and projects that have stemmed from the Senior Advising Group:

- **Advisor Recognition Committee** – Subcommittee focusing on recognizing and appreciating the work of advisors.
- **Advisor Training Committee** – Subcommittee working to develop a centralized, comprehensive, online training highlighting informational, conceptual, and relational advising topics. The training will contain module-based content to allow flexibility. Also coordinated and ran a test class on Advising Theory with NACADA for a group of 29 advisors across campus.
- **Advisortraining.unt.edu** – This website is a resource being developed to support advising. It will house, in one location, advising tools/software, referral information for campus resources, campus-wide advising goals and expectations, and opportunities for advisor training/professional development.
- **UNT Run-Around Working Group** – Subcommittee reviewing policies and practices that may contribute to students experiencing the UNT run around. The goal of the committee is to collaborate across campus to eliminate some of the barriers our students face that may be impacting retention and student success.
- **Centralized Communications Plan** – Subcommittee focusing on creating a strategic campus-wide communication plan promoting advising for all students. Provides advising offices with email and social media templates for various communications throughout the year, FTIC lists/registration reports for retention purposes, and marketing materials for the "Get Advised" campaign.

We'd love to have your feedback on these on-going projects, in particular, the advising website. If you are interested in reviewing and providing feedback for the website, please contact your training committee representative or Lisa Maxwell.

\* If a student is actively sitting out a suspension then they will not be able to change their major between any of the colleges/schools.

Once the student is eligible to return, and needing advisement for the upcoming semester; they may meet with their new college/school if they meet the GPA requirements listed above.

If the student is returning from an indefinite suspension, they will need the appropriate signature from the college/school of their major at the time of their suspension.

## DID YOU KNOW?



“SPIRIKI, A BRONZE EAGLE STATUE, WAS UNVEILED IN 2011 AT UNT'S APOGEE STADIUM. AS MEAN GREEN PLAYERS TAKE THE FIELD, THEY TOUCH THE STATUE TO PLEDGE THEIR BEST EFFORTS IN THE GAME. THE STATUE BY RENOWNED WILDLIFE SCULPTOR KENT ULLBERG WAS COMMISSIONED BY THE GEEZLES, A CAMPUS FRATERNITY FROM THE 1920S TO THE 1970S THAT INCLUDES MANY FORMER ATHLETES AND COACHES. THE NAME "SPIRIKI" COMES FROM AN OLD FRATERNITY GREETING BELIEVED TO BE THE COMBINATION OF THE WORDS "SPIRIT" AND "KEE," THE CRY OF AN ATTACKING EAGLE.”

## HOT TOPICS IN HIGHER ED

Prior learning assessment (PLA) and Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) are this newsletter’s hot topic in higher education. Most higher education institutions, including UNT, already use specific external prior learning assessments such as CLEP. In the past, I have heard these called “credit for life or work experience.”. Schools across our state, and nationally, have developed, are in the process of developing, or having initial conversations about both PLA’s and CPL as ways to help students to complete a bachelor’s degree.

Credit for prior learning (hereafter referred to as CPL) is more about overall policies and procedures for assessing student knowledge or skills learned in nonacademic settings (like work) . Prior learning assessments (hereafter referenced as PLA) are the ways of evaluating or grading prior learning. PLA’s represent the different types of courses, exams or assignments students complete to earn. These include but are not limited to portfolio courses, credit by examination (CLEP and AP exams), military transcripts, and foreign language examinations.

I recently attended a one-day conference for helping academic advisors understand PLA and CPL better. Attendees were encouraged to identify both external and internal PLA’s that their home institution already utilizes or accepts. The table below is my attempt to do that however it only includes PLA’s that are accepted campus wide. It includes the name of the assessment, a web link to it or how UNT accepts it, and a summary description.

UNT Admissions may accept lower- and upper-division military credit, as recommended by the American Council, as traditional or vocational credit.
College Credit for Workforce Training	<a href="http://www2.acenet.edu/credit/">http://www2.acenet.edu/credit/</a>	This is like the military transcript but includes professional/corporate training from a number of different organizations, companies, and government agencies.
DSST (Dantes Service Test)	<a href="http://getcollegecredit.com/exam_fact_sheets">http://getcollegecredit.com/exam_fact_sheets</a>	This used to be a credit by exam program exclusive to active duty military and veterans. It is now available to any student. I like DSST’s because some of the exams count as upper division credits
UNT Foreign Language Placement Tests	<a href="http://worldlanguages.unt.edu/resources/testing/placement">http://worldlanguages.unt.edu/resources/testing/placement</a>	Students can earn 3-12 hours of freshman/ sophomore level credit for demonstrated proficiency in specific foreign languages.

Please keep in mind that your college, school or department may have specific policies on using or NOT using these assessments or credits. One reason may be based on accreditation standards. Limits also exist for credit by examination (CLEP especially) and are detailed on the listed UNT webpage. It is good for advisors to know about these credit options, it is equally important to know IF and HOW these credits will be applied in their programs and what alternative programs may use them. If you are unfamiliar with one or more of the PLA’s listed it’s a good idea to discuss it with a supervisor or an experienced advisors in your office.
